

Rainier Audubon Conducts 3rd Annual Bird-Count

Greetings, Soos Creek Botanical Garden

Very warm thanks go to you for opening up the Volunteer Room for Lucia, Curt and I as we participated in the 119th annual National Audubon **Christmas Bird Count (CBC)**, the 41st annual CBC for our chapter, Rainier Audubon, on Sunday Jan 2nd. In the snow!

This count was the most scenic, beautiful Christmas Bird Count I have ever experienced, and we've had some sunny, lovely days in the past. While the snow cover and icy spots made walking feel treacherous, I loved what I saw everywhere even though the birds hid.

We are so grateful that your beautiful garden is within our 15-mile diameter CBC Count Circle. I regret not asking for permission to come onto the property before I did. I was so pleased with the friendly welcome from you, Jim Daly and Carmen gave me back in Dec 2019, for our first CBC visit.

This year, with the temperatures hovering around freezing most of the morning, we three were especially thankful for the hot tea, indoor restroom, and the wall heater! It helped make this our best CBC ever. Thank you for filling the bird feeders, that was kind of you!

While we did not see many species on this year's visit, our only White-crowned Sparrow of the whole day was spotted by Curt in your garden. Also seen was Lucia and Curt's only Red-breasted Sapsucker of the day (I had seen one at Mary Olson Farm in the

morning.) Curt watched it fly across the lawn, and Lucia and I were able to study it closely when it landed on a tree right next to us! I had just that minute pointed out to her the many sapsucker holes on nearby tree trunks, and here it came!

Three <u>Song Sparrows</u> and nine <u>Crows</u> were observed. A male <u>Spotted Towhee</u> was eating the red jewel-like fruits of a Barberry, not stopping when we came along. I'm saving my favorite sighting for last – a <u>Pacific Wren</u> hopped around on the snow offering us one of the best views we've ever enjoyed. It showed up so well against the white background, staying out in the open for several minutes!

I'll send our species list for the day in a separate email. If you or anyone is curious about what area we covered, the Count Circle is shown via a link in the December 2021 online newsletter, the *Heron Herald*, if you click on the CBC info and scroll down the page you end up on; ours is Area 2. I usually only cover the northwest half, with Highway 18 as the dividing line, but Curt and I covered the southeast half as well on Jan 2nd since team members Ken and Linda were in CA.

Soos Creek Vegetable Demonstration Garden

The Soos Creek demonstration vegetable garden is funded and managed by the Master Gardener Foundation of King County with additional in-kind support from the Soos Creek Botanical Garden and educational resources from Washington State University.

The demonstration garden is designed to demonstrate ways in which modern visitors can successfully cultivate high value crops, and to demonstrate to urban children how their food is grown. During the 2021 garden season, 2,600 pounds of fresh produce were donated to the Auburn food bank.

Food production has nearly doubled by following gardening principles of no tilling, composting, use of cover crops in winter, and monitoring soil temperatures and moisture content prior to planting. Crop rotation and barrier methods have decreased plant infections and insect invasions. Overwintering of cool weather crops, protective cloches in spring, shade cloths in hot weather, and use of perennial vegetables have extended the growing season.

Community volunteers are welcomed and encouraged to assist the Master Gardeners. Children who show an interest in gardening are welcome to participate under adult supervision.

Gardening related questions from visitors to the garden are welcomed and encouraged during work hours.

Master gardeners are on site for work parties Wednesday and Saturday mornings from 10am to noon.

Washington State University requires proof of vaccination and masks for volunteers, age five and above to work in the garden.

gardens, a chance to start their own collections and a source of information and advice on those roses.

We have quarterly meetings, sometimes with a guest speaker, and events include our annual rose display, field trips both local and distant, and service projects to support Old Garden Roses.
